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Welcome! Eston Communities in Bloom is pleased to introduce you to our community.

Our group works diligently at promoting the Communities in Bloom program and encouraging community pride, a benefit to everyone. The Town of Eston supports our local Communities in Bloom by way of an annual \$2500.00 grant and having one council representative available to attend our meetings. The Town crew has been very busy this spring extending our town's local camping sites, opening up new trailer lots, and developing new housing lots in response to a busy influx of new oil industry workers in our area. As well, they have continued to support the Town Council and our Communities in Bloom in keeping the town clean and in good repair, as well as welcoming. In July, the town crew took part in a Tree Pruning Workshop hosted by our group in conjunction with Andrew Exelby, from Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation. The town's water tower was sandblasted and painted in July with our new town logo, *Golden Fields and Harvest Moons*.

The Town of Eston is located in the heart of West Central Saskatchewan at the junction of Highways 44 and 30, within the boundaries of the Rural Municipality of Snipe Lake. It is an oil-rich area which boasts prime agricultural land as well as many opportunities for hunting and fishing. It is approximately 15 miles north of the South Saskatchewan River and the Eston Riverside Regional Park, a prairie oasis boasting excellent camping, a nine-hole golf course with grass greens, a swimming pool and a recreation hall. The Lancer Ferry which crosses the South Saskatchewan River is nearby.

The town boasts a busy business district with services including a drug store, a grocery store with liquor vendor, two motels, restaurants, two gift shops, a bakery, a service station and a card lock, a bank, a credit union, a dumping station, a lumber yard, a hardware store and a farm implement/car and truck dealership. Tradespeople, including plumbers, electricians, carpenters, building contractors and welders are resident in the town. There are also a number of businesses serving the local agricultural industry. Eston has its own weekly newspaper, *The Press Review*, and a local television station. The Saskatoon *Star Phoenix* is available on a daily basis.

The town has a resident physician and nurse practitioner, a health center where both emergency and long term care services are available, and a chiropractic clinic.

Eston has its' own local RCMP detachment, with two members residing in the community.

The Regional Library on Main Street has a large selection of books, magazines and other materials and provides free internet service. Eston is linked to a province-wide network for the borrowing of books and other library materials. The **local genealogical society** has a small library within the main library. Copies of the local newspaper are available on microfilm from 1917 to the present.

The Community Complex is a large multi-use recreation and convention centre that provides year-round recreational opportunities including hockey, bowling, curling, figure skating, and access to the local Larry Thome Fitness Centre. Adjacent is the Eston Lions Swimming Pool which offers public swimming, water aerobics and swimming

lessons during the summer season and Reaburn Field, the senior ball diamond. There are several minor ball fields located nearby as well. There is also an in-town camp ground adjacent to the community complex. Two other parks, Jamieson Park and Henry Hamilton Park, also provide **green space**.

Eston has two private dance schools, as well various offerings of aerobics, boot-camp, and other fitness classes. Classes are also available in other areas of fine arts, such as instrumental and voice lessons.

The local Wheatland Plus 50 Club provides a varied program of activities for those over 50 years of age.



Eston boasts three **municipal heritage buildings**, one on Main Street, the local museum complex, and the Prairie West Historical Centre. In addition to preserving artefacts illustrating the area's past, the Centre is also building up a collection of archival material pertaining to the area.

The town has two schools, Eston Composite - a K-12 school, and Eston College, a degree-granting institution (formerly the Full Gospel Bible Institute.)



There are four active churches: Eston Full Gospel Church, Holy Cross Anglican Church, Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Church, and St. Andrews United Church.


There is an airport in town with two paved runways; #11 is .92308 km long while #16 is 0.6 km long.

Annual events in Eston include Ladies Night Out in April; the June Eston indoor Rodeo; July 1st Canada Day events include a parade, sports events at the recreation grounds, a beef-on-a-bun lunch and a heritage program at the museum; fowl suppers are held in season; the Ducks

Unlimited Dinner takes place in October; Bizarre Bazaar, a large craft show and sale is held in November, as well as a museum fundraiser - Christmas in November, a ladies luncheon, fashion show and silent auction; a local drama group, E.P.I.C. hosts an annual Dinner Theatre/ community Christmas party, and the Eston 95 Lions host a Christmas light tour for seniors. There are many, many more events throughout the year, including ball, soccer, golf, curling, hockey, the skating carnival.

Eston offers up an assortment of service and social clubs including two Lions Clubs, Ducks Unlimited, Prairie West Historical Society, the Arts Council, Music Festival Committee and a Genealogical Society.

We are a group of volunteers that make up the Eston Communities in Bloom group, which was begun at the request of the Town of Eston. Community support is sought through word-of-mouth activities, local advertising, mail, media reports, and posters of events such as community clean-ups, etc. Through media write-ups, we also regularly request information from community groups detailing events or projects that would be considered under the umbrella of Communities in Bloom.

Our core group meets at various times throughout the year to plan work bee dates and various projects. Any new projects that need Town help in implementing and maintaining are always pre-approved by Town Council.)

2015 Communities in Bloom Projects (September 2014 to August 2015)

- NEW for 2015 New Perennial/Shrub Bed at town Campground Entryway beside town fire hall
- NEW for 2015 Fall Tulip Bulb sale fundraiser
- NEW for 2015 Planning and fundraising began for a new
 Centennial Park in the downtown business district. Phase 1 of the
 development will be started in the spring of 2015; Phase 2 final
 touches in the fall and spring of 2015/2016.

Maintenance and Continuation of previous Communities in Bloom Initiatives

• Mulch (Tree Peelings) (a CIB Initiative) – we continue to sell mulch

to local residents, as well as adding mulch in our own perennial beds annually.

 Banners (a CIB initiative) – we purchased banners that are hung every spring on the street light poles on main street

Hanging Flower Baskets (a CIB initiative)

 we purchased, and now plant, maintain, and help water hanging baskets on main street (watering help from the Town crew during the week)

Bloomin' Barrels (one of our first CIB initiatives!) – we purchased, and annually plant and maintain several "urban desert" flower planters around town, as well as a few of the cement planters and various oak barrel planters downtown. Our "old" whiskey barrel planters were given out to various local businesses for planting.

• **Eston Gopher** – CIB plants and maintains flowers around the gopher and looks after weed control, as well as recruitment of groups to help with maintenance repairs and to build the fence behind the gopher.

- CIB has initiated and developed the following Perennial Beds, as well as the continued maintenance of:
 - Andrea's View
 - Pocket Garden on east side of Main
 - Peace Park
 - Henry Hamilton Park
 - New Pocket Garden on west side of Main
 - Campground Pocket Garden
- **Town Entrance Planters** (a CIB initiative) continued maintenance of native perennials in the planter boxes at the entry signs to town
- Work Bees CIB does regular cleanup in various areas around town.
- Weed Control in various areas around town
- Local Yard Judging (CIB Initiative) an annual project to involve community members in recognizing residents who work so hard at keeping up their yards.

Brief History of Eston Communities in Bloom

Eston Communities in Bloom, or "CIB" as we call it, was started in 2000 at the request of the Town of Eston. A small group of like-minded people got together, and with a grant from the town, we began. Our goal was to focus CIB as an ongoing "community project" that would not only improve the looks of our town and encourage civic pride, but would also earn our community a good rating in the annual provincial judging.

Eston CIB's first year concentrated on the business section, promoting and fundraising to purchase wooden barrels that we filled with flowers and placed along Railway Avenue and Main Street. (... these are our Blooming Barrels that you still see downtown today.) We also held



several community "clean-up" days. We received 1 Bloom that year.

Since the first year of inception we have many taken on many different projects including, but not limited to, the following:

- information booths at the local trade show
- sponsored pumpkin, tomato and flower growing contests and craft projects for children
- held boulevard tree-pruning days
- annual community clean-up days
- recently we hosted a table at the town's first "Welcome to Eston and Volunteer Organization Showcase"
- held a spring tree pruning workshop, with sponsorship from SPRA
- have helped with the dividing and re-planting of heritage peonies at the Eston cemetery.

Over the years, the community has learned more about Communities in Bloom, and has seen firsthand the benefits to our community. The banner of CIB has paid off in many ways for our community and we hope to continue for years to come.

"Communities in Bloom - People, Plants and Pride... growing together"

Tidiness (of green spaces, medians, boulevards, sidewalks, ditches and road shoulders including garbage, debris and weeds. Signage, posted notices, scrap yards, unattended or vacant lots, alleys and buildings are also included.)

- Local CIB holds cleanup nights (street, sidewalk and lot cleanups)
- Individuals Local Walkers pick up garbage, bottles, etc. as they are out on daily walks
- Caring Hands local volunteer group of Health Centre staff that look after the grounds and beautify the inside of the building as well
- In addition to regular garbage pickup, the Town of Eston offers a spring and fall back alley pickup to pick up yard refuse.
- The school staff and students do an annual spring cleanup of litter around the schoolyard and town streets.
- The Gatenby community group holds their own spring cleanup in their neighbourhood
- Town policy is to cover or remove graffiti when it appears.
- Adopt-A-Lot Program people can "adopt" town lots for their own use, with the agreement that they will be responsible for cleaning and keeping the lot mowed, tilled, etc.
- The Town has introduced a new Community Appearance Policy to promote individual and business tidiness
- The Town of Eston has a weekly front street garbage pickup; a weekly recycle pickup; and regular monitoring of the town landfill site.
- the Town owns a Street sweeping vehicle
- Streets repaired regularly; some newly paved streets every year with long-term plans to continue

Purpose:

To provide incentives for the residents and businesses in Eston to improve the appearance of their properties to the benefit of the

community.

Policy:

Residential:

- As part of the Communities in Bloom judging for best yard in Eston a
 listing of properties showing a considerable effort into appearance of their
 property will be made by the judges. The criteria for the selection will
 include general appearance of the property. Properties with painting or
 renovations completed in that year will also be eligible.
- By random draw improved properties will receive a cash
 payment of \$100.00. The number of payments will be limited to 50%
 of the properties selected to a maximum of four.
- For rental properties where the improvement is related to the building the owner will receive the payment, where it is in regards to the appearance and maintenance of the yard the payment will go to the tenant.

Commercial:

- Commercial properties that have and maintain a plant display will be eligible for a random draw for a cash prize of \$150.00.
- 2. Commercial property owners who improve the appearance of their property by painting, renovations or landscaping may enter their name into a draw for a \$150.00 cash prize to be applied to their taxes.

Heritage Conservation (museums, archives, history books and interpretive program. Policies and bylaws on preservation and restoration of buildings, homes, churches, cemeteries, sites, parks, heritage gardens, trees, monuments and ar6tifacts are important to a community's heritage. Involving the historical society and heritage advisory committee is important.)

- Prairie West Historical Society – we have a strong, active museum and committee that works towards preserving, restoring and educating our community on historical artifacts, buildings, etc. On July 1st they held a dedication to the newest addition, a school barn.

- Museum offers regular tours and demonstrations to both local and out-of-town school groups

- The local Prairie West Historical Society hosts annual Canada Day celebrations at the museum


Floral Displays (Includes arrangements, originality, distribution, location, balance, color, variety, harmony and maintenance of flowerbeds, planters, containers and window boxes.)





- you will note many floral displays throughout our community. CIB has worked hard to maintain several of these displays, as well as encouraging local residents and businesses to do the same

- Communities in Bloom barrels are placed in various areas around town, with CIB members doing the planting and maintenance
- Town-owned Concrete Planters are placed in front of businesses on main street with local businesses alternating year to year on the planting and maintenance of the planters
- Hanging Floral Baskets purchased by Communities in Bloom are hung on streetlights on main street, with Town Employees and CIB members sharing the watering duties
- Local businesses and community members are encouraged to plant and maintain their own flower beds in front of homes and businesses
- A Perennial and Annual Flower bed has been started in an abandoned brick building on Main Street, adding great visual appeal to that area
 - Perennial Flower beds developed and maintained by CIB members include 3 small parks on main street; Andrea's View on Railway; and beds in Henry Hamilton Park













Environmental Action (with regards to sustainable development including policies and by-laws on waste reduction, landfills, hazardous waste handling, sewage disposal, recycling and transfer stations. Also environmental practices including IPM-Integrated Pest Management, water sources and conservation, environmental clean-up activities, naturalization and living in harmony with nature, and environmentally friendly transportation are all included.)



- Sparks Waterway project local Squirts group has painted around several town manholes to raise public awareness in keeping our waterways and storm sewers free of chemicals and pollutants.
- Town offers curb side pickup for recycle materials.(In partnership with Sarcan). The Town won an award for being a good steward of waste the Waste Minimization Award, hosted by Sask Waste Reduction Council and Sask Power.

BYLAW NO. 12-2010

A BYLAW of the Town of Eston, in the Province of Saskatchewan, to increase recycling.

THE COUNCIL FOR THE TOWN OF ESTON IN THE PROVINCE OF SASKATCHEWAN ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

SHORT TITLE

1.1 This Bylaw may be cited as Landfill Recycling Bylaw

2. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Bylaw is to eliminate the disposal of recyclable materials in the landfill.

3. DEFINITIONS

- 3.1 In this Bylaw:
 - a) Recyclable Materials

Includes all materials that can be deposited or collected for recycling in the Town of Eston and includes, but is not limited clean cardboard and paper, plastic and glass containers, batteries, tires and electronic equipment.

b) Scrap Metal

Includes all metals with the exception of tin cans and propane tanks.

c) Landfill Supervisor

Any employee assigned duties or person contracted by the Town of Bston to provide supervision at the landfill.

4. ACCESS TO LANDFILL

- 4.1 Public access to the landfill is not available for any recyclable items as determined by the Town of Eston with the exception of scrap metal.
- 4.2 The Landfill Supervisor shall determine if any material is recyclable and will require that it not be unloaded.
- 4.3 Failure to follow the instructions of the Supervisor or disposing of recyclable materials at the landfill will result in future access of any kind being denied.

5. OFFENCES AND PENALTIES

- 5.1 No person shall:
 - a) fail to comply with to this Bylaw;
 - obstruct or interfere with any Landfill Supervisor or any other person acting under the authority of this Bylaw;
- c) fail to comply with any other provision of this Bylaw.

 5.2 A Landfill Supervisor who has reason to believe that a person has contravened any provision of this Bylaw may have served on that person a Notice of Violation, which Notice of Violation shall indicate that the Municipality will accept voluntary payment in the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to be paid to the Municipality within thirty days.

Urban Forestry (Written policies, by-laws and regulation plans. The distribution of trees, variety, suitability, new plantings, main street programs, new survey developments, preservation of heritage trees, woodlots, and re-planting procedures. Having qualified personnel (volunteer or staff) for professional maintenance, pruning, IPM and trouble-shooting.)

- Town has adopted policies for the management, selection and replacement of trees
- Town has obtained equipment, including a bucket truck, and has trained employees for proper pruning techniques
- Town will be investigating options for Dutch Elm Disease Inspection now that the province is no longer supporting this service in this area
- A variety of trees have been planted to increase diversity both for aesthetics and to mitigate problems in a disease or pest that affects particular types of tree

- the Town is utilizing IPM to protect trees through early identification of pests and diseases
- In September of 2013 the Eston CIB received a \$5000 grant from Canon which was used to plant over 250 trees in the start of a new Urban Orchard located on old school grounds, potential for small fruits. In the spring of 2013 Saskatoon bushes were added. In the summer of 2013 our Communities in Bloom group has voluntarily done several "weeding" work bees around these newly planted trees. - in July of 2014 Communities in Bloom held a Tree Pruning workshop, sponsored by Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation. Town employees attended the workshop, as well as many community members.

ESTON COMMUNITIES IN BLOOM URBAN ORCHARD PROJECT



In September 2012, phase one of a new Urban Orchard and Park took root in the community of Eston. The local Communities in Bloom committee were the fortunate recipients of a \$5,000 Canon Take Root grant, sponsored by Canon and Evergreen. The grant was used to begin the development of this new park, encompassing help from the Town of Eston, Communities in Bloom, Eston Composite School students and community volunteers. Upon completion, over 500 new fruit trees and shrubs will be planted in this new urban orchard and park.



To prepare for phase one, the local town crew prepared the new park grounds for planting and tree maps were laid out, trenches dug and watering plans put in place. The morning of September 27 brought bright sunshine, warm weather and lots of eager hands to help begin phase one of the planting. To kick-off the day, a brief assembly was held at the school and Eston Mayor, Al Heron, spoke about the importance of planting trees, telling students and community volunteers that in 20 years "they will be able to visit

the park and see what a difference their contributions have made in the community for generations to come." Following that, Cathy Cocks, an orchard owner from Empress Alberta, gave an instructional presentation on the importance of trees and a quick lesson on how to plant the trees. Once the brief presentations were completed, it was off to the planting site!

What a sight to behold, with over two

Over 250 trees and shrubs were planted, with some earmarked as memorial trees. People dedicating memorial trees were welcome to take part and personally plant the tree that would be dedicated to their loved one, with memorial markers placed at a later date. Once all of the planting and watering was completed, the Communities in Bloom committee supplied a barbeque lunch for volunteers.

Future plans for the park include walking paths from all four corners of the park, intersecting in a centre site that will feature benches, flower gardens and statuary. This park is being built in the true spirit of community and will be enjoyed by many in the years to follow.

	TREE PLANTING POLICY

Purpose:

To provide a guideline for planned planting of trees within the Town of Eston that will be successful and add to the beauty of the community.

Policy:

- The Town of Eston requires that planting of shade trees, ornamental trees and coniferous trees on public property, boulevards or adjacent to the street or boulevard be from Appendix A – Tree Suitability.
- Permission must be obtained in advance for any planting on public property including the boulevard between a private property and the street.
- The spacing between trees will be determined by the potential size of the mature tree. The following guidelines are provided.

Boulevards - Minimum of 20 feet for:

- .1 Ornamental Trees
- .2 Small shade trees
 - Minimum of 30 feet for:
- .1 Large shade trees (poplar)
- Adjacent private property (can be closer with written agreement between property owners)

Yard Planting - Minimum of 10 feet from:

- .1 Adjacent private property (can be closer with written agreement between property owners)
- .2 Underground services such as water, sewer, gas, electric and telephone.

- Minimum of 15 feet from:

- Sidewalk, street or alley.
- .2 Traffic signs, street lights or fire hydrant.
 - Minimum of 30 feet from:
- .1 Intersection
- Trees planted closer than allowed under this policy may be removed, trimmed or moved by the municipality at any time.

- School grounds grass area maintained by Sun West School Division

- School Staff volunteers maintain and plant the areas around the Stepping Stone Path, Shirley Sim Owens Memorial Bench, the Meagan McNabb Memorial Flower Bed and the remaining flower beds in the school grounds
- Town owned boulevards it is the expectation that home owners and residents maintain their respective boulevard area
