

Deficiencies Introduction



Deficiencies in Parks and Open Space can be defined as anything that detracts from the safety, beauty or enjoyment of the park or open space area.

When entering and working in an open space work site, you should constantly be on the lookout for cosmetic or structural deficiencies, as well as anything out of the ordinary, or anything that could be hazardous.

Parks and open spaces are extensively used, and are thus subject to wear and tear, storms, rodents, vandals and other causes of dangerous or unsightly conditions. As a member of the community, you are an ambassador for both community citizens, and the visitors to your community. An important part of your job is to ensure that our parks and open spaces are both sources of pride and enjoyment for everyone. The community is depending on you to fix what needs fixing, and to report anything that requires additional attention.

Awareness and common sense are essential skills for spotting deficiencies. Be constantly aware of your surroundings and look for any changes. Observe the area around you as you would your own home and yard. What looks out of place? What might be damaged? What is in need of repair or replacement? What could be hazardous to your family, friends or pets?

Moments of Truth

A Moment of Truth is every episode where someone comes in contact with any aspect of the community and gets an impression of its service.

In any given service situation there are hundreds to thousands of possible Moments of Truth.

These Moments of Truth can be:

People experience these *Moments of Truth* on an intensely personal basis. Their positive and/or negative perceptions of these moments can affect their attitudes, opinions and decisions regarding all aspects of the community.

Hazards

Hazards are deficiencies that pose safety issues. These include such things as:

Some Hazards Found in our Parks



Here you'll notice an uncapped receptacle that holds electrical wires.

Raised water valves such as this one can easily be hidden by tall grass or weeds.





This exposed pin could cause significant damage to a mower or trimmer.









Structural Deficiencies

Structural deficiencies are structures (e.g. buildings, steps, waterfalls, benches, etc.) that, through wear or damage, have become unsafe or unsightly. These include such things as:




Some Structural Deficiencies Found in our Parks



This significant irrigation leak had flooded a large area of the park, which has made it a hazard to mow the area.

Wear on these steps at a local park could soon become a safety hazard.





Dead trees are not only unattractive, they can also pose a safety concern during high winds or storms



Unfortunately, this damage to newly laid sod is not only costly and unsightly it was also caused by a community truck.









Cosmetic Deficiencies

Cosmetic deficiencies are anything that takes away from the physical beauty and enjoyment of the parks. Examples of cosmetic deficiencies include:

Studies have shown that speedy removal of graffiti in an area is a deterrent for this type of future behavior. Tall weeds along sidewalks or boulevards need to be trimmed or pulled before they reach this stage.


